Are we WASTE AWARE?

Are you aware of what happens with the waste that you create every day or that each one of us creates about 4.3 pounds of waste per day? Most people ignore what happens to their waste once that magical trash collecting truck passes by their house. Laziness or confusion about recyclable items add to the waste that ends in a trash bin. In a past issue we briefly discussed how recycling materials end up being converted to another good and therefore are not wasted. In contrast, non recyclable items such as food waste or refuse become trash and are sent to a managed landfill. A landfill is a piece of land where waste materials are buried as a form of disposal. The waste is then confined to a small area, compacted and covered by soil layers.
